



FLOW CHART 1: LEGAL OBLIGATIONS UNDER THE GDPR

RIGHT TO BE INFORMED	You must provide fair processing information. RIGHT OF ACCESS	Individual has the right to obtain: - confirmation that their data is being processed - access to their personal data - other supplementary information- this largely corresponds to the info that should be provided in a privacy notice.	https://ico.org.uk/for-organisations/data-protection-reform/overview-of-the-gdpr/individuals-rights/the-right-of-access/	Articles 12, 15 Recital 63
RIGHT TO RECTIFICATION	If data is inaccurate or incomplete, the individual has the right to have their data rectified. If such data were disclosed to a third party, they must be informed where possible. RIGHT TO ERASURE	Individuals have a right to have personal data erased and to prevent processing in specific circumstances such as: - when they withdraw their consent, - where individual objects to the processing, - where the personal data is no longer necessary in relation to the purpose for which it was originally collected/processed, etc.	https://ico.org.uk/for-organisations/data-protection-reform/overview-of-the-gdpr/individuals-rights/the-right-to-erasure/	Articles 17, 19 Recitals 65, 66
RIGHT TO RESTRICT PROCESSING	Individuals have a right to 'block' or suppress processing of personal data. When processing is restricted, you are permitted to store the personal data, but not further process it. RIGHT TO DATA PORTABILITY	Data subject can request data from an old Controller in a readable format and move it from one provider to another. RIGHT TO OBJECT	Individuals have the right to object to: - processing based on legitimate interests or the performance of a task in the public interest/exercise of official authority (including profiling); - direct marketing (including profiling); and - processing for purposes of scientific/historical research and statistics.	https://ico.org.uk/for-organisations/data-protection-reform/overview-of-the-gdpr/individuals-rights/the-right-to-object/	Articles 12, 21 Recitals 69, 70
RIGHTS IN RELATION TO AUTOMATED DECISION MAKING AND PROFILING	The GDPR provides safeguards for individuals against the risk that a potentially damaging decision is taken without human intervention.
